Module: **Understanding Online Boundaries**

**Learning Outcomes**

- To allow youth to become more aware of how they define boundaries personally online

**Materials Needed:**

- Privacy Post worksheets, pens and colored pencils

**Agenda at a glance**

- Students will be creating their own privacy posts that are their own personal ideas of how they interpret their own online boundaries
- Students will think about who they befriend online (friends, family, strangers, co-workers, school peers)
- Students will also reflect on what they share online and what they are consuming online
  - This includes personally identifiable information (photos, address, school location, family photos, photos from childhood)
  - These categories could also include memes, videos, quotes, direct messages, posts, and status updates
- There is no “right or wrong” answer, and students should share at whatever level they feel comfortable
- The “Privacy Posts” in length can be short or long, but should be original from the students perspective

### Privacy Post Worksheet

Reflect on the information you take in (consume) on social media and write those responses here: *(Example: consuming memes, quotes, photos etc.)*

Reflect on the information that you put out on social media and write those responses here: *(Example: putting out selfies, school location, family photos)*

Write your own personal “privacy post” that will be 1-3 sentences long. This can include anything you would like it to be and this is based on what you wish to share, show, and read online that is related to your own personal online privacy.
